It affects us all the same way. As the incubation period for COVID-19 is particularly long, we have no way of knowing where or when it will appear in our community, and so we must all think and act as if we will catch it next. Be kind to those around you, don't act with suspicion or prejudice. Take in the correct, official information, and act accordingly to keep yourselves and our communities safe.

I believe that we must all act intelligently as one community to overcome this virus. We cannot predict what will happen next. "Don't spread the virus, and protect yourself." We must live with these words in our minds as we work together to keep our community safe and healthy, with guidance from experts and our country.

CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) INFORMATION

As the situation across Japan, in our prefecture and our city is constantly changing, we would like to provide you with information that may be useful in the coming weeks. Preventing rapid spread of the virus and "cluster" infections is now critically important as the situation worsens worldwide. Japan is showing a rapid increase in patients, especially in larger cities like Tokyo, but also within Fukushima prefecture. Please read the following information carefully, and contact us if you have any questions.



AVOID THE 3 C's!

- **CLOSED SPACES** with poor ventilation
- **CROWDED PLACES** with many people nearby.
- **CLOSE-CONTACT** settings, such as close-range conversations.

Precautions

- Avoiding the 3 C's (see above)
- **Washing you hands** thoroughly and regularly with soap and water, or an alcohol based handwash.
- Practice proper **coughing etiquette** (coughing/sneezing into a handkerchief, tissue, or elbow, facing away from others, disposing of used tissues properly etc.)
- **Avoid touching your face.**
- If you suspect you are developing symptoms of COVID-19, **stay home**. Do not go out unless absolutely necessary, and if you must go out, wear a mask and follow the above precautions.

State of Emergency Declaration

The State of Emergency has now been expanded to cover the entire country, and most public spaces, schools, and events are now closed or cancelled until May 6th at the earliest. You can get the latest prefectural information in English from Fukushima's Governor at this site:

If you suspect you have COVID-19 **DO NOT** go straight to a hospital or clinic **DO** contact the Returnees/Virus Exposure Centre if the following apply;

- You have a **fever of 37.5 or higher for four or more days** (two days if you are pregnant, elderly, or have an existing medical condition).
- You experience **heavy fatigue and/or trouble breathing.**
