### Update: Aizu's Covid-19 Vaccine Rollout

#### Vaccination Passes for Aizu Residents Ages 16 - 64 to be Distributed This Month

Aizu Wakamatsu city will soon begin distributing vaccine passes by post to all residents between the ages of 16 and 64. Vaccine passes are to be sent out starting July 15, and can be expected to arrive by July 21st. Older residents and those with underlying health complications will be prioritized for earlier vaccination. Please remember to make a reservation during or after the period indicated on your vaccine pass.

#### Vaccine Reservations Can Now be Made Online

Until recently, reservations to receive the coronavirus vaccine could only be made by phone. For obvious reasons, the city has finally implemented an online reservation system. Reservations to receive a vaccine can now be made through the Aizu Wakamatsu city homepage.

#### 78% of Aizu's Elderly Have Received at Least One Dose

According to a report from the city office, 27,961 elderly people in Aizu had received at least one dose of the coronavirus vaccine as of June 20th. This number accounts for 78% of Aizu's 65 and over population.

## Member Spotlight: Kimura Yūta

Troubled by the amount of food waste he saw happening around the world, Yūta Kimura has long dreamed of working in a country suffering from hunger and poverty. In 2019, he enrolled in the Asian Rural Institute, located in Tochigi Prefecture. There, he studied organic farming and livestock care, before later joining the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA). Every year, JICA dispatches representatives to developing countries around the world to share agricultural technologies and techniques. After many years of preparation and waiting, Kimura has finally been scheduled for dispatch to Kenya later this summer. As he gears up for his journey, Kimura shares with us the formative experience he had during his time at the Asian Rural Institute.

### “That We May Live Together”

“That we may live together.” This is the motto of the Asian Rural Institute (ARI). Founded in Tochigi prefecture in 1973, the school aims to provide a place for students from around the world to become “Rural Leaders,” capable of guiding agricultural industries in their home countries.

The curriculum of study at ARI takes place over 9 months across all four seasons. Students study topics like organic farming, livestock, environmental concerns, religion, gender, poverty, and a wide range of social issues present both within Japan and around the world. The curriculum encourages students to foster a mindset of “servant leadership,” which enables them to return to their home countries as rural leaders, capable of implementing the skills and knowledge they have gained from their studies directly into their local industries. Now, with the serious introductions out of the way, I’d like to tell you about my year and a half of living and studying at ARI! I was motivated to attend ARI because I was interested in International Cooperation, and I wanted to fill the gap in my knowledge regarding manufacturing and agriculture. When I arrived on campus, my first impression was that it was a place like no other. Despite being located in Japan, it felt nothing like Japan! All the students spoke English as a common language, so each day was like a rollercoaster ride.

Every day began with radio calisthenics, and from morning until night the other students and I shared meals and living spaces with people whose countries and cultures were all completely different from our own. But the diversity and variety was what made the experience so much fun, and filled each day with rich new experiences. I could feel my mind opening to new possibilities, and I met new people that I would have never had the chance to meet otherwise. Through those new friendships, I also learned things that no amount of classroom study or field training could have taught me. The memory of my dynamic experience at ARI, and the incredibly valuable friendships I made there will surely be with me for the rest of my life. Even now, my friends from ARI and I remain connected by sharing reports and new information with each other. After all, we believe in sharing ideas and working together, “so that we may live together.”

I encourage everyone to contemplate this idea of working “so that we may live together.” There have been so many uncertainties during the Covid era, but with a bit of luck, I’ll be headed to Kenya as a JICA representative later this summer. As I consider how I can make a positive difference in the local community, and how I can convey the joys of learning and discovery, I will do my best to contribute to “a future where we live together.”


