





Since Tom moved to Aizu, he's joined in a lot of our events, including AtsuHana, FIND, and our Summer Night event last year! He even gave a speech at our Nihongo-de-Hanasou event in November. Tom was kind enough to tell us about himself and his home town of Olney, England.

Olney has some interesting history to it!

My name is Tom Wilkinson, I'm a 28-year-old from the UK, and I have been living in Aizu since June last year! Aizuwakamatsu is my wife's hometown which is why I decided to move here from the UK (although I have lived in Japan - Shikoku and Tokyo - before). Since moving here, I have really enjoyed exploring the beautiful scenery and fascinating history around Fukushima. Today, however, I want to introduce my hometown back in England.



I come from a small town in the English countryside called Olney. If you were to imagine a traditional English countryside town, you would probably be imagining something very similar to Olney. There are many beautiful old

houses, four different pubs, a market selling meat and vegetables every Thursday, and a lot of little shops full of interesting things.

My wife told me I also have to mention that there are a lot of sheep. Apparently in Japan it is quite rare to see farm animals around the town. In my hometown, if you walk for about 5 minutes you can see hundreds of sheep, horses, cows, and even alpacas!

Olney is an old and historic town, with two big claims to fame. First, it is the place where the worldfamous hymn 'Amazing Grace' was written and first

performed. John Newton wrote the song while he was the head of the local church and published it in his book the Olney Hymns. Amazing Grace has now been sung by some of the most famous singers in the world and performed at very highprofile occasions.

Second, Olney is the home of the pancake race. The Olney Pancake Race is an annual event that takes place on Shrove Tuesday (about 40 days before

Easter). During the race, women from the town dress in aprons and scarves and run a course through the town's streets while carrying a frying pan. In their frying pans, the participants must carry a pancake and flip that pancake at certain times. The



challenge is to reach the finish line first without dropping the pancake. The winner of the race is traditionally awarded a kiss from the verger (church official) at the church door.

All across the UK, pancake race events are held on Shrove Tuesday, but Olney is the original race. In fact, the legend of the race dates back to the year 1445 (nearly 600 years ago)!

According to the story, a woman in Olney was busy making pancakes when she heard the church bells ringing for Shrove Tuesday. Realizing that she was late for the church service, the woman ran to the church while still wearing her apron and carrying the frying pan and pancake.



Today, women from the town follow in her footsteps by running to the church in the same way! Men are not allowed to participate in the main race and you must live in the town to join.

Pancake races are an unusual tradition, but if you are ever in England in February maybe you will see people running through the streets with frying pans!
