She moved back to Georgia, USA at the end of July. She had many adventures in Japan and took the time to tell us about some of them!

## 'Fearlessness is key to creating unforgettable memories.'

#### Did you have any problems in your life in Japan?

The concept of tatemae and honne doesn't exist in America, so I often found myself wondering whether people were being genuine or simply polite. I pride myself on being direct yet kind, which can be rude in Japanese. I found that a more passive approach was often preferred in Japan, which can be considered rude in America! I'm grateful for the opportunity to be challenged by new perspectives and ways of thinking!

## Your makeup is so beautiful. Is there any difference between Japanese and American makeup?

I love doing my makeup! In the U.S., people often use bronzer to create a tanned look, contour and highlighter to define their features, eyeshadow and eyeliner to elongate their eyes, and overline their lips to make them appear fuller. In Japan makeup tends to focus on lightening the skin, using blush and highlighter to create a youthful appearance, eyeliner to create a rounder eye, and applying lipstick in a more blended manner. The differences are fascinating to observe.

#### Did you try to learn Japanese? Do you find it difficult?

One of my goals in moving to Japan was to learn enough to navigate daily life and better understand the culture, since language and culture are so deeply intertwined. I found Japanese relatively easy to speak but, it's challenging due to its complex writing systems, structure, and contextual nuances. Although I don't plan to become fluent, I'd love to continue casually studying Japanese for the rest of my life.

#### I heard that you can be adventurous, tell us about that.

I enjoy traveling solo, joining in on events, and trying new things. I planned spontaneous solo trips to Kyoto and Okinawa just a week in advance, and ended up dining and spending evenings with strangers I met along the way, while trying to fit in as many experiences as possible. A bit of fearlessness is key to creating unforgettable memories.

#### How was your life in Aizu?

Living in a place with such rich history and a distinct local culture was amazing. I found comfort in the sense of community I felt. I grew to cherish the warmth and familiarity that come with truly getting to know a place. I made many close friendships, discovered favorite spots, and felt a genuine sense of belonging. No place is

perfect, but Aizu was the perfect place for me to spend three years of my life.

#### Is there anything you want Japanese people to understand?

One of the first phrases I learned when I arrived in Japan was "The nail that sticks out gets hammered down." But for most foreigners, standing out is inevitable, and many have experienced varying levels of discrimination or discomfort in Japan. However, diversity enriches our lives. While Japan has its own unique and deeply rooted traditions, there's so much to gain from embracing different cultures and ideas. Embracing diversity doesn't mean losing one's identity; rather, it can enhance it, creating a more vibrant and inclusive society.

#### How did you feel participating in Tajima Gion Festival?

We stayed overnight at the salon and woke up at 1:30 AM to start preparing. It was fascinating to wear the intricate bridal kimono. people started photographing us at 5 AM while we were still at the salon! The parade was long and hot, but carrying the offerings and watching the ceremony inside the temple felt like a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to be part of such a historic and revered festival.

#### Do you have memories of other festivals?

One of my favorite festivals was the Hakata Dontaku Festival(Fukoka), which had the longest parade I've ever seen. And of course, the Aizu Festival was so exciting. I loved dancing in the parade. At the International Festival in 2022 I was in charge of some games and the Kid's Corner, which I themed around county fairs. It was so fun to share one of the biggest



annual events in many American communities. The international festival might be one of my favorite Aizu memories.

#### What are your plans for the future?

My biggest dream is to continue traveling and learning about cultures around the world. Living in Japan and being involved with AWIA taught me that you don't necessarily need to travel to learn about other cultures; you can start by engaging with those in your own community.

## Is there anything you would like to tell the members of AWIA (our association)?

I'd really just like to say thank you! In my first week in Japan, I went to AWIA and volunteered at my first event. That experience allowed me to get involved in the community and meet so many wonderful people. Aizu is fortunate to have a group of people who want to learn about the world, and offer support that can shift the entire dynamic of someone's experience working, studying, or living in Aizu, whether they're from Japan or other parts of the world.
