## **New Year's at Tsuruga-jo Castle**

## Ring the Castle Bell!

Ring the bell at Tsuruga-jo Castle for good luck in the new year! In Japan, it is tradition to ring a Temple Bell 108 times at midnight. Head over to Tsuruga-jo and try it yourself!

### Meshi-bera!

If you're heading to the Tsuruga-jo for the new year, why not head inside and see the beautiful view of the city from the top of the tower! The first 5000 people who go into the Castle Tower will receive a meshi-bera (a wooden spatula for good luck in the new year. Each meshi-bera is branded with the zodiac kanji for 'snake' and 'Tsuruga-jo'. They're great keepsakes!

## Yanaizu Enzoji

Ring in the New Year at the Temple from the Akabeko legend. The Yanaizu Nanokado Hadakamairi happens every year on Jan. 7th at the Enzoji Temple.

It is said by showing off their strength and muscles, they scare off the Dragon-god who lives in the Tadami River that plagued the town. Watch men participate in this old tradition of warding off bad luck and illness by climbing up the Temple bell rope wearing only a loincloth!

## **Aizu in Winter**

In Aizu, about half of the region's annual precipitation comes from snow. The Oku-Aizu area has some of the heaviest snowfall in Japan, sometimes getting more than 1m of snow in one night. AizuWakamatsu City gets ~90 days of snowfall in a year, with the deepest snowfall reaching up to 115cm.

## Winter Tips:

- Wear tall boots to keep your feet dry.
- · Walk like a penguin to prevent from falling.
- Watch out for injury or becoming trapped from falling snow and for open sewer grates in sidewalks during snow removal.

## Interview with MUROTA Ayaka

MUROTA Ayaka is from Chiba Prefecture and she came to Aizu to study at the University of Aizu. She is affectionately called 'Mumu-chan' by many members. This is the part 2 of the interview with her who was the 2024 International Festival Committee Head. We asked her about her experience on exchange overseas. For her, it was a life changing experience that not only improved her English, lead to greater understanding of other cultures, and personal growth. We got the details!

Cebu Island Challenge! Gaining English Skills and Confidence on Exchange

## We've heard that you went on exchange to the Philippines, but could you tell us why you decided to go?

I went to Cebu for a language exchange for one month. A big reason I went was to see how well I could do in an English only environment. I also wanted to challenge myself to see if I could live by myself overseas.

### How was living on Cebu?

I lived in a 3 person room at my language school's dorm with two people from Taiwan. During the first orientation, we were organized by country so I spent some time with other Japanese people, but I made sure to take advantage of the time with the other people who were doing their best to converse in English.

Though it was an English-main environment, there were times when I couldn't communicate well. For instance, when I was with a group of Korean speakers, I was the only who couldn't following the conversation, and I felt horrible. At that time, I felt it was especially important for

me to do my best to be proactive about speaking to people in English. I felt the language barrier, but asking about what they were talking about, going to hangout at game centers; I felt the barrier start to come down.



# It seems you worked hard to overcome the language and cultural barriers! That must have been a great opportunity for you to understand more about multiculturalism, don't you think?

Yes, I really think so. I was really able to enjoy myself and get to know the people around me much better by being proactive in speaking English. I was really lucky to be able to speak to so many people from different

countries, and I think I made a lot of friends, especially from Korea and Taiwan. Even with different nationalities or cultures, just by proactively speaking to each other with open hearts, I really felt how we were able to bridge the gaps between us.



### How was the language school?

I lived life in English everyday. Classes were separated by level, and there were one-on-one classes as well as group discussion classes. The discussion classes were especially difficult for me. We would have to speak on topics of current issues like 'Single Mothers' and 'Climate Issues' where not only do you have to properly convey your opinion, but have the teacher dig deeper by asking 'and why do you think that?' At first, I had a tough time explaining my thoughts clearly.

## Having discussions in English is pretty high level. How did you overcome this challenge?

To be honest, at one point I struggled so much that I thought about changing my

classes. Once, I was on the verge of tears, but I reminded myself that I'd come to the Philippines to challenge myself. I had only one month there, so I couldn't allow myself to run away. I told myself 'If I run away from this,



then coming here will become pointless.' which helped me reframe and regroup. I knew giving up halfway would be unfulfilling, and I didn't want to lose to myself.

### That's so amazing. Have you seen any results from that?

Yes! I was even surprised that I became able to translate for the newly arrived Japanese people. I also gained confidence in the discussion classes and could convey myself well. I was extremely happy when at the end, I even received applause from everyone. I did also see the biggest results in that my TOEIC speaking and listening scores went up 100 points.

### Finally, can you tell us your next goal?

I plan on focusing on studying what I want to learn. I'm

thinking about continuing with AtsuHana, and around July next year, take a break from school, and going to study overseas in America or Europe. Up until now I've tried to be a participant in a lot of things, but now I want to



be the one to put information out there. I also want to put effort into my graduation thesis.
