Zhao Peng

Zhao Peng is a Chinese student at the University of Aizu and he has been an active member since he came to Aizu in the spring. He was one of the presenters at AWIA's Nihongo-de-Hanasou on November 25th. He has been working hard to study Japanese, and knows English very well! He has written a little about himself and his experiences in Fukushima:



My communication with friends in Fukushima started when I was still a student in China. My Japanese tutor, Hirai Riko, is a college student born in Aizu. Being taught patiently about pronunciation and grammar, I started to gradually gain confidence in Japanese. Then, I started my master's program at the University of Aizu in April 2023 and after joining the Japanese lessons at the International Association, I felt my Japanese improve even more.

I continuously pursued any possible new experiences after I started my life in Japan. This November, I participated in a joint activity with the high school students of Futaba Future School. I, together with my group members, visited many places in the Hamadori area in Fukushima, and discussed and presented on our unique ideas. After I was back in Aizu, I made another presentation the very next day at the City Learning Center, in the "Nihongo-de-hanasou" activity!

In my opinion, communication is not as simple as speaking one or more languages. I could feel the willingness of other attendees to understand each other from our eye contact when we were making our presentation. Communication is a chance for me to share my opinions, understand other people's words, and further change myself based on the sympathy generated in my heart. I would like to participate in such activities next year continuously with AWIA to talk with various people all over the world.

Yanaizu's New Year's Festival

Ring in the New Year at the Temple from the Akabeko legend. The Yanaizu *Nanokado Hadakamairi* happens every year on Jan. 7th at the Enzōji Temple.

It is said there is a Dragon-god who lives in the Tadami river. By showing off their strength and muscles, men prevent it from plaguing Yanaizu once again. Watch them participate in this old tradition of warding off bad luck and illness by climbing up the Temple bell rope wearing only a loincloth!

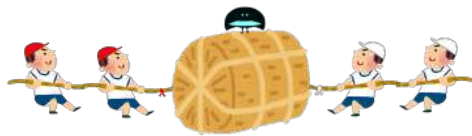
