Autumn Leaves: Nagatoko

Around mid November

Rich yellow leaves of a 30 meter tall gingko tree cover the grounds of Shingu Kumano Shrine and the Nagatoko (long floor) worship hall, a beautiful large open air wooden structure of 44 thick wooden pillars built in ancient Heian Era style. The grounds and tree are lit up in the evenings too! Experience the fall colours alongside ancient Japan.

The COP15 Conference

On July 15th 2025, Lake Inawashiro was designated as a protected wetland by the Ramsar Convention. From July 24th-30th, I had the opportunity to go to Zimbabwe as an interpreter for representatives from AizuWakamatsu in order to accept the designation. I spoke about COP15 and Zimbabwe in Part 1 in our September 2025 edition of the Newsletter. This time, I talk about what we did at the conference on July 26th.



On July 26th, we attended the COP15 at the Elephant Hills Resort in Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe. Lake Inawashiro was to receive its designation as a Ramsar site from the Secretary General, Dr. Musonda Mumba in the afternoon. That ceremony was our whole reason for coming to Zimbabwe! Before then, we had the whole morning to see the conference.

We walked around and saw booths from different coun-

tries, and also volunteer organizations dedicated to protecting the environment. Many people from around the world were wearing traditional clothes like Indonesian Peci hats, or bright patterns from around Africa. We brought some traditional happi coats, and once we put them on, we stood out a lot. A Chinese man commented how the traditional

Aizu kanji(會津) on the back is also used in his language. A group of young people from Kenya wanted a happi them-

selves! So, we let them try the coats on and took some pictures together. Some people were interested in the 'Samurai City' pamphlets we had at the booth. I love Aizu, so I was very grateful for the opportunity to share information about AizuWakamatsu and Fukushima with many people from around the world.

When we made our way to the

main conference area, they handed us headsets connected to small radios. They had different channels; one for the conference audio and others with people doing simultaneous interpretation. We heard from delegates from places like Canada, China, and Indonesia give suggestions on revisions to the convention and offer their expertise. It was really interesting to listen to experts

discuss the details of environmental protection policy. The language was specialized. I did my best to convey what was said in Japanese. It was an interesting experience for me. We were alongside envi-

ronmental experts making adjustments to policies that will improve environmental protections of wetlands around the world. I felt really lucky; I was trusted to be a small bridge between Aizu and the world. I really felt the limitations of my Japanese skills, but the experience has also inspired me to work harder and be better.

After lunch, it was time for our main event! Our event provided a space Lake Inawashiro to be recognized, and for researchers from Japan and Korea to share information on the usefulness of rice paddies as environmentally protected



There were many people at

areas. It was MC'd in English by the Ministry of Environment of Japan who introduced the speakers, and main represent-atives from Fukushima. As the largest of the three cities representing Lake Inawashiro, Koriyama City gave the main speech. The leader, wearing a yukata, gave a small speech in English, thanking Ramsar for the designation, and everyone for coming. She did a wonderful job! Then they played a

video message from the Mayor of Koriyama with English subtitles, and a PR video of Lake Inawashiro. A representative from AizuWakamatsu closed off our portion with a promise to protect the beauty of Lake Inawashiro, and a hearty 'Thank you!' I was very impressed with the effort everyone put into preparing for

this moment. They had to speak in English, and all did really well! I felt really proud to be there to support them.

In the evening, we got to meet Dr. Musonda Mumba, the Secretary General of the Ramsar Convention. She has been involved in international environmental efforts for years, and even started the Network of African Women Environmentalists. We had only 15 minutes of her time, but she sat down with the main representatives and spoke with them a little. My role here was to interpret from Japanese into Eng-

lish. The other interpreter was very supportive in interpreting Dr. Mumba's words into Japanese for us. They introduced themselves, and showed her the video message from the Mayor of Koriyama. We had brought some gifts for her to highlight Fukushi-

ma. From AizuWakamatsu, we gave her an Aizu lacquerware coffee cup, and an Akabeko. Then, it was time for the photo. If you saw the newspaper article, that photo was from this moment! I'm standing outside of the camera view to support those I can.

This was a day filled with environmental policy, research, and networking. Next time, I'll talk about the other things we got to see, and how I felt about the whole experience.
